From the Rabbi's Desk

Dear Congregants,

new year stands before us. Not as a promise that everything will be easy, but as an invitation to become more intentional, more grounded, and more faithful to what truly matters.

he past year has shaped us. Some of its lessons were learned publicly, others privately, in moments of struggle, loss, or quiet endurance. Jewish tradition never asks us to look away from complexity. It asks us to meet reality with honesty and to sanctify it through how we live.

elcoming 2026 means choosing depth over noise. Thought over reaction. Responsibility over resignation. Our tradition is rigorous because life is rigorous. Torah does not offer escape. It offers meaning. It teaches that moral clarity is built slowly, through daily choices, disciplined learning, and ethical action.

his year also reminds us how much strength already exists



within this community. Strength that has carried families through difficult seasons. Strength that has sustained learning, prayer, and acts of care even when energy was low and answers were unclear. That strength is real, and it is enduring.

This year calls for strengthening what sustains us. Learning that challenges the mind. Prayer that refines the heart. Acts of kindness that restore human dignity. The sages taught that the world stands on truth, justice, and peace. These pillars are not ideals alone. They are practices, expressed in speech, behavior, and the way disagreement is handled.

ommunity is not created by uniformity. It is created by covenant. By the willingness to carry responsibility for one another even when differences remain. In a fractured world, that commitment is not only demanding. It is deeply hopeful.

et 2026 be a year of earned hope. Hope grounded in effort. In consistency. In small, faithful acts that may never be noticed yet never go to waste. Let it be a year of growth without pretense, courage without hardness, and faith that strengthens both mind and soul.

M ay this year bring healing where there has been pain, clarity where there has been confusion, and renewed confidence in the goodness that can still be built together.

Message from the Co-Presidents

irst, we want to wish everyone a very happy and healthy secular New Year! May 2026 be a year of peace, health, happiness, and wishes that come true

T his past month we celebrated a very joyous and uplifting Chanukah partyone that we will long remember.

s we step into January, we are reminded that the Jewish calendar gives us a rare gift: the chance to begin again more than once. We've already welcomed 5786 with the introspection of the High Holy Days, and now the secular New Year invites us to pause once more—this time not with solemnity, but with possibility. It also brings Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of the Trees. It's a holiday that reminds us that growth often begins invisibly, beneath the surface. Even in the coldest months, roots deepen. Our community is no different. The seeds we plant now -through learning, connection, and generosity-become the strong branches that support us throughout the year.

January always arrives with a kind of quiet afterglow. The candles of Chanukah have long since burned down, Christmas lights are slowly disappearing from our neighbors' homes, and the world feels like it's exhaling after a month filled with celebration, family, and ritual.

t's a good moment to reflect on the unique relationship between these two holidays (Chanukah and Christmas)—distinct in meaning, history, and theology,

yet inevitably intertwined in the rhythm of American life.

Or Jews living in a predominantly Christian society, Chanukah often becomes part of a broader cultural season. Many of us grew up navigating the dual experience of honoring our own traditions while being surrounded by the imagery, music, and excitement of Christmas. And while the holidays are not parallel—one marks a military victory and the rededication of the Temple, the other celebrates the birth of Jesus. But perhaps the most meaningful connection between them is not historical or religious at all.

It's emotional.

b oth holidays bring light into the darkest time of the year. Families gather around tables, stories, and rituals. Both remind us that hope is something we kindle—sometimes with a match, sometimes with a melody, sometimes simply by

showing up for one another.

In recent years, many interfaith families have found thoughtful ways to honor both traditions without blending them.

They light the menorah with intention, celebrate Christmas with relatives respectfully, and teach their children that identity is strengthened—not diluted—when we understand the traditions around us. These conversations, held around kitchen tables and living room sofas, are part of the evolving story of American Judaism.

s we move into January, the lights of both holidays gifts differs: may be packed away, but the values they represent remain with us: resilience, generosity, gratitude, and the belief that even in the darkest season, we can create warmth and connection.

very January, after the wrapping paper has been recycled and the menorahs have been polished and put away, many of us find ourselves reflecting on the unique dance between Christmas and Chanukah. These holidays—so different in origin and purpose—often meet in the same living rooms, the same families, and the same hearts.

nd some of the most meaningful insights come A from the stories we tell.

ne congregant once shared that her grandchildren, growing up in an interfaith home, would run to the window each night in December—not to look for Santa, but to see whether the neighbors' Christmas lights or their own menorah would shine brighter.

er daughter told them, "Both lights matter. One reminds us of miracles, the other reminds us of generosity."

 he children didn't compare; they simply delighted in the glow. It was a reminder that children often understand coexistence better than adults do.

nother member recalled a year when her son A asked why Chanukah gifts were "smaller" than the Christmas presents his friends received.

S he answered honestly: "Chanukah isn't about gifts. It's about courage, identity, and rededication. "One of Her sons "still remembers that Chanukah as his favorite. The "small" gifts turned out to be the ones that lasted.

any years ago, Gail invited a close Christian coworker to a Christian coworker to a Chanukah gathering. The coworker had never seen a menorah lit in person.

s the blessings were sung, she whispered, "This feels like Christmas Eve—quiet, hopeful, full of warmth." It wasn't a theological comparison; it was an emotional one. Two traditions, each with its own sacred story, but both offering a moment of stillness in a noisy world.

 Gift-giving has become a shared language of December in America. But the meaning behind the

- Christmas gifts often symbolize generosity, love, and the spirit of giving.
- · Chanukah gifts, in their modern form, reflect joy, family connection, and the desire to make the holiday feel special for children growing up in a multicultural environment.

istorically, Chanukah gifts were modest coins, gelt, small tokens. The holiday was never meant to compete with Christmas. Yet in many Jewish homes, gift-giving became a way to affirm lewish identity rather than dilute it. A way to say: We have our own traditions, our own stories, our own light.

y the time January arrives, the frenzy of December fades, and what remains are the values beneath the wrapping:

- Resilience from the Chanukah story
- · Generosity from the Christmas season
- · Family and community from both
- · Light in dark times, shared across traditions

 hese holidays don't merge, but they do speak to one another. They remind us that meaning isn't found in the size of a gift but in the intention behind it.

s we move into 2026, may we carry forward the best of both seasons: the courage of the Maccabees, the warmth of giving, and the simple joy of bringing light—literal and metaphorical—into the world.

M ay this new month bring renewal, resilience, and moments of joy.

ay the glow of the past month carry us forward into a year filled with clarity, kindness, purpose and peace.

Sisterhood Book Discussion


Sisterhood will meet on Sunday, January 4, promptly at 10am at the Synagogue to speak about our next book, "All Who Go Do Not Return", a memoir by Shulem Deen. This is a deeply honest and moving story about a man's decision to do something so simple and so radical — to live in accordance with his own beliefs. It is an enormously powerful and important book about faith, doubt and freedom.

This is a very fascinating story told with exquisite sensitivity. The author is a former Skever Chasid — a member of an insular Chasidic sect. He knows little about the outside world — only that it is to be shunned. His first transgression — turning on the radio — is small, but his curiosity leads him to the library, and later to the Internet. He begins to question his religious beliefs and later his faith unravels entirely.

The setting may be the world of Chasidic Judaism, but the insights are universal. Join us for this discussion - it should be very interesting.

The BIKUR CHOLIM **COMMITTEE** is looking for blank greeting cards that you would like to donate. These cards are used to send speedy recovery and good wishes to those who are sick and recovering from an illness. Please bring any cards you have to the office. Thank you.

Bikur cholim (also transliterated bikur holim) refers to the mitzvah (lewish religious commandment) to visit and extend aid to the sick. It is considered an aspect of tion of one pint of gemilut chasadim (benevolence, selflessness, loving-kindness). It is traditional to recite prayers for healing, such as the Mi Shebeirach prayer in the synagogue, and Psalms on behalf of the sick. The earliest bikur holim socie- ture notices about this ty on record dates to the early Middle Ages. The roots of bikur holim can be traced back to the Torah, when G-d visits Abraham after his circumcision (Genesis 18:1).

Here at Congregation Beth Tikvah our committee strives to keep in touch with members who

are ill or even just need to have their day brightened a bit. We send cards, make phone calls, visit and may even provide a drive to an appointment or assist with occasional shopping.




